Dear Parents,

As the new school year moves forward you may be wondering what you can do to help your child improve academically. The short answer is: reading.

- Reading to your child regardless of the language of the text, sitting with someone and being read to
 have many benefits to learning. Children hear the proper pace and inflection, are able to associate
 sounds with symbols (words/letters), and perhaps most importantly gain a sense that being literate is
 valued by those they look up to and respect.
- Your child reading to you (or a sibling) practicing reading out loud, in English or Vietnamese, helps to build literacy skills that can transfer to different learning situations. It can allow you to better understand your child's proficiency, see their progress, and also builds stronger, more supportive relationships.
- Modelling reading set aside time each day for everyone in the home to be reading. Doing so even as
 little as 30 minutes per day can model good reading habits, which helps children to value it and increases
 the chances they will read for pleasure as they get older.
- Reading resources students in Years 1-6 can access MC Online and RAZ Kids from home. Each of
 these online resources allows children to use materials at their current ability level that also help to track
 their progress and development.

Reading truly is the fundamental skill around which others revolve. Making sure your child is a strong reader will go a long way towards helping her/him success in other subjects as well.

Dear Parents,

A very warm welcome to returning students and all our new families!

Kindergarten has gotten off to a smooth start. The children are learning how to form a community and to be comfortable in a school setting. They are learning school routines and expectations, trusting class environment, initiating their play, exploring different materials, making new friends, and learning two golden rules: be kind and be safe.

We know that, for some of you, this is your child's first time away from home. Below are few tips to ease your child's separation anxiety:

- **Create quick good-bye rituals**: Keep it short and sweet. If you linger, the transition time does too. And so will the anxiety.
- **Be consistent**. Try to do the same drop-off with the same ritual at the same time each day you separate to avoid unexpected factors. A routine can diminish the heartache and will allow your child to simultaneously build trust in her independence and in you.
- **Attention**: When separating, give your child full attention, be loving, and provide affection. Then say good-bye quickly despite her antics or cries for you to stay.
- **Keep your promise**. You'll build trust and independence as your child becomes confident in her ability to be without you when you stick to your promise of return.
- **Be specific, child style**. When you discuss your return, provide specifics that your child understands. If you know you'll be back by 3:30 pm, tell it to your child on his terms; for example, say, "*I'll be back after afternoon snack*." Define time he can understand. Talk about your return from a business trip in terms of "*sleeps*." Instead of saying, "I'll be home in 3 days," say, "*I'll be home after 3 sleeps*."
- Practice being apart. Ship the children off to grandma's home, schedule playdates, allow friends and
 family to provide child care for you (even for an hour) on the weekend. Before starting school, practice
 going to school and your good-bye ritual before you even have to part ways. Give your child a chance
 to prepare, experience, and thrive in your absence!

We are looking forward to a wonderful year with you and your family. Your child will have lots of learning opportunities while having fun!
