PREPARATION FOR SA1 EXAMINATIONS

Singapore International School has an examination period of approximately two weeks at the end of Semester 1 (Tues 7th Jan – Fri 17th Jan 2014). During this period examinations will be held in English, Mathematics, Science, Chinese and Vietnamese. The English examination will consist of four parts covering writing, vocabulary/grammar/comprehension, speaking and listening.

Teachers will do in-class revision in the two weeks leading up to the examinations however it is important that along with teacher directed revision students begin doing some extra revision each night in the six weeks prior to the examination period so as to be fully prepared.

<u>English</u>

As the English examination consists of four papers it is imperative that students cover the four areas in their revision.

Students should begin by revising all vocabulary and grammar rules covered in the semester. They should read-over all new vocabulary so as to understand the meaning and the spelling, and re-do grammar exercises from their homework book so as to identify any problems in understanding. Students should then follow up with the teacher **before** the examinations if they are having problems. Revision of these two areas is valuable for students when completing both the Writing Paper 1 and the Comprehension/Grammar/Vocabulary Paper 2.

All students should also get into the habit of reading an English book for 10-15 minutes each evening. This not only exposes them to new vocabulary and improves comprehension but also allows them to become familiar with common sentence structures. They should also practise reading aloud whenever possible to help improve fluency and pronunciation. If there is an English speaker in the house then students should be encouraged to converse and to talk about their day at school or the book they are reading in English to improve their speaking and listening. Watching TV shows in English is also a good way to improve their listening skills.

Mathematics and Science

For Mathematics it is highly recommended that students not only read over the topics and learn the rules they have covered but also that they pick questions from their workbook and do them again so as to practise actually solving problems using the methods they have learnt. If students don't remember or fully understand all the steps involved in solving a problem they should follow up with the teacher.

For Mathematics and Science it is strongly recommended that students **write a summary** of important facts and formulas as they read over their textbooks. This allows the students to have all the important information in a short, and more easily studied, form. Also students have a far better chance of fully understanding and remembering information if they write it down rather than just read it.

Chinese/Vietnamese

Although the subject teacher will give specific direction to students in their revision, in general students should approach the study of Chinese or Vietnamese in a similar way as they approach English. They should revise all vocabulary, definitions and grammar rules. Once again it is recommended that students study by actually writing sentences to practise grammar and spelling.

I encourage all students to talk to their teachers prior to the examinations if they are having any problems understanding anything covered in the semester.

Head of Study's News – Chinese

I would like to introduce to you the HSK test (Han Yu Shui Ping Kao Shi). This is a renowned worldwide assessment test, where students' language levels will be better targeted to facilitate their learning. It will also allow parents to make better plans for their children according to the syllabus. HSK, with six levels of writing tests, is an internationally standardized Chinese language ability test based on the Chinese Language Proficiency Scales for Speakers of Other Languages, and it is the only officially recognized Chinese language test in China. In Ho Chi Minh City, there are two testing centers providing the HSK bi-annually. At our SIS campus, several students have completed this test in different levels, and 5 of them have passed level 4 or above which is a very big achievement!

Oh Sug Hyun, who is in IGCSE 2, is currently preparing for the HSK level 6 test this coming May. This is the highest level in HSK test.

"I have learnt Chinese for more than 5 years. My parent told me that I must know this language well ever since I was a little kid. For me, I think more than 25% of the world's population uses the Chinese language, so we cannot ignore it for any reason. Moreover, if I want to enter one of the top three universities in Korea, the HSK score is an important fact they consider, so I must pass level 6 HSK."- Oh Sug Hyun (IGCSE 2).

Just last month, our school library purchased many books about the HSK test, and we want to encourage our students to take the HSK test, and to make a good plan for their Chinese learning. If the parents want to inquire about HSK, please contact: lin.yujie@saigonsouth.sis.edu.vn.
